For Today: Homeward Bound

At the last stage of their life, salmon make a homeward journey after living up to 7 years in the ocean. This journey is fraught with many dangers, obstacles, and difficulties—predators, rapids, fishers. They must bravely travel sometimes thousands of miles to find home, the exact river where they were born. They must change their body function, to adapt to fresh water. After this, they spawn to give new life, and then they die.

The journey of salmon tells us a lot about our life on Earth. We must work hard to survive because it just is not a favorable place for us. It is not our true home. We have to accept hardships and pain and adapt to it.


